Armistice Day 2023—70th Anniversary

Delegates from 22 countries gathered in South Korea for the war anniversary including 64 foreign veterans who were invited by South Korea's Ministry of Patriots and Veterans Affairs for a six day visit from Monday July 24th to Saturday July 29th in commemoration of the 70th anniversary of the 1953 Armistice Agreement that halted the Korean War.

The 22 nations that participated in the Korean War are the United States, Australia, Belgium, Britain, Canada, Colombia, Denmark, Ethiopia, France, Germany, Greece, India, Italy, Luxembourg, the Netherlands, New Zealand, Norway, the Philippines, South Africa, Sweden, Thailand and Turkey.

27 July 2023 marked the 70th anniversary of the signing of the Korean Armistice Agreement, which ended over three years of fighting on the Korean Peninsula. The Korean War started on 25 June 1950, when North Korean troops invaded South Korea. United Nations forces soon joined the fighting, which would rage until an armistice was signed on 27 July 1953. More than 26,000 Canadians served on land, at sea and in the air during this bitter conflict. Sadly, 516 Canadians died. Canadian Korean War Veterans participated in the Revisit Korea Program at the invitation of the Republic of Korea's Ministry of Patriots and Veterans Affairs. While in Korea, they attended ceremonies and events to recognize those who served in uniform during the Korean War and mark the 70th anniversary of the signing of the Korean Armistice Agreement (July 27).

Prior to their departure, the Veterans headed to Burnaby, British Columbia, where they participated in a commemorative ceremony and events with the Korean Consulate in Vancouver.

In Korea, the Veterans were accompanied by a Government of Canada delegation, led by the Honourable Lawrence MacAulay, Minister of Veterans Affairs and Associate Minister of National Defence. The delegation also included other Members of Parliament, a Veteran representing the Assembly of First Nations, and a historian from the Canadian War Museum.

While in Korea, the delegation participated in commemorative ceremonies in Gapyeong and the United Nations Memorial Cemetery, as well as the Republic of Korea's signature ceremony for the 70th anniversary of the Korean War Armistice Agreement.

From Veterans Affairs Canada

- Eight Canadian warships served in the Korean War. These destroyers helped blockade the Korean coast, conducted counter-mining operations, guarded against enemy amphibious landings, protected the United Nations fleet, attacked onshore targets and provided humanitarian aid to isolated fishing communities.
- The Royal Canadian Air Force No. 426 Transport Squadron ferried troops and supplies between North America and East Asia. By the end of these duties in 1954, they had completed 600 round trips across the Pacific, carrying more than 13,000 passengers and three million kilograms of freight.

From Veterans Affairs Canada continued

- Canada was the third largest contributor to the multi-national force in Korea. Although the Korean Armistice Agreement was signed on 27 July 1953, an additional 7,000 Canadians served between the cease-fire and the end of 1955, with some Canadian troops remaining until 1957. The names of 516 Canadian war dead are inscribed in the Korea Book of Remembrance on Parliament Hill in Ottawa.
- The anniversary of the signing of the Korean Armistice Agreement, July 27, is also known in Canada as Korean War Veterans Day since the passing of the Korean War Veterans Day Act in 2013.
- In 2023, Canada and Korea celebrates 60 years of diplomatic relations. Canada's involvement during the Korean War (1950-1953) and sustained positive political and economic cooperation contribute to the close relationship between the two countries.
- To the present, Canada contributes members to United Nations Command (UNC) Headquarters based in Pyeongtaek, Korea. In 2018, Canada's current Chief of the Defence Staff, General Wayne Eyre, served as the first non-American Deputy Commander of UNC.

In The News

Indonesia Activates Second Tranche of Rafale Orders

Indonesia has activated its second order for 18 Rafale multirole fighter jets from Dassault Aviation as part of a \$2.3-billion acquisition program signed in April 2023. The Rafales are replacing Indonesia's aging F-5 supersonic light fighter aircraft from Northrop Grumman.

The Indonesian and French defense ministries signed a contract in February 2022 for 8.1 billion euro to provide the air force with a fleet of 42 Rafale fighters. Dassault delivered the first tranche of six Rafales for \$1.1 billion to Indonesia in September 2022. The latest tranche brings the total to 24 aircraft of the 42 to be acquired. Indonesia's order for the latest version of the French-built fighter is on a complete "turnkey" basis. Alongside the aircraft, Indonesia receives corresponding technical training.

Belgium Refuses Deliveries of F-35's

August 10, 2023, the Belgian Defence Ministry has refused deliveries of the first two F-35A stealth fighters ordered in October 2018, with the aircraft reportedly found to be "technically unsatisfactory" and requiring further software improvements before meeting the Air Force's standards. The fighter program has been plagued, by extreme performance issues with approximately 800 defects still afflicting it - a number which has not changed significantly in well over half a decade due to both the slow speed at which issues are resolved and the continuous discovery of new flaws. These issues have not only left the fighter unviable for high intensity combat, which is not expected to change at least until close to 2030, but they have also seriously undermined its availability rates, imposed billions of dollars' worth of additional operational costs, and at times placed the lives of the fighter's operators at risk. A notable recent example was the report from a U.S. Air Force investigation released in June showing that an F-35 destroyed in an accident at Hill Air Force Base in Utah on October 19, 2022 had crashed due to a software issue, which left the pilot unable to abort its landing sequence as it stopped responding and sharply banked to the left.



The F-35's performance has been very widely criticized by both military and civilian officials, as well as in reports from foreign operators such as South Korea, with its very low availability rates at around 30 percent, and lack of reliability, taking a serious toll on the operational readiness of fleets adopting the aircraft. Upgrades to the F-35's software have notably faced considerable delays, with software issues set to cut production by approximately 50 aircraft in 2023 down to only around 100 airframes with significant consequences for the delivery rates to foreign clients.

The Pentagon does not expect the flight certification process to be complete until December at the earliest, but potentially as late as April 2024.

New British Report on F-35 crash raises broad safety concerns

After the loss of a British Royal Navy F-35B operating in the Mediterranean Sea in November 2021, an investigation into the incident has raised serious questions regarding the safety of the country's operations using the aircraft. The inquiry highlighted multiple deficiencies regarding how the F-35 was operated and recommended 46 changes be made. The paper called for a better understanding among commanders of "safety and security requirements for a fifth-generation platform," adding that "introduction of special access programs" such as the new stealth fighter had "elevated security thresholds, which places extra strain on safety."

Despite being a first tier partner in the F-35 program Britain has made deep cuts to its orders for the aircraft compared to prior expectations due to budgetary restrictions. This combined with a slow delivery rate has forced the Royal Navy to deploy a U.S. Marine Corps F-35B guest contingent for carrier operations, although the carriers much like the F-35s themselves have often been unable to operate due to their own frequently arising performance deficiencies.

The report further raised serious questions regarding whether Britain's sole frontline F-35 squadron, 617 Squadron, was fully ready to deploy complex stealth aircraft, highlighting that the unit "faced a higher operating tempo than it was prepared for, as the Carrier Strike Group aspired to a baseline flying rate associated with so-called surge operations." It noted high levels of fatigue among British personnel operating F-35s, with decreased opportunities for fresh air and recreation and a lack of routine access to outside space being among the contributing



Personnel notably had not received the necessary levels of training for operations at sea. The report comes as multiple countries have had serious difficulties adapting to F-35 operations, with the aircraft suffering from approximately 800 performance defects as more issues continue to be discovered.


Wreath to Honour Fallen members of 450 Squadron


