His presentation was very interesting as he talked about his time flying the CF-100 Canuck (Clunk), the records he set, and saving the lives of four people in a light aircraft by guiding them to the nearest airfield in very poor weather conditions. He spoke on his service in North Bay, Parent and Falconbridge, and his career following release. He is also working on Air Force Heritage projects during his retirement.

7. As I See It – 441 Wing Padre Doug Crocker

My late father served as a reserve Chaplain with the then Royal Canadian Navy for a number of years beginning in the early 1950's. This meant that his five children had the privilege of occasionally having a window into the life of the armed forces during the early Cold War years. I remember as a young boy on

an exciting tour of a ship at the west coast base of Comox learning that the "Officer's Mess" was nothing like what we had to clean up at home. I recall feeling envious that my older brother was invited aboard the deck of а submarine docked at Esquimalt. I suppose they were concerned a seven-year-old could slip off the boat's rounded edge. I also came to learn that the navy trained inland bases like at Edmonton where I was born. In fact, my first introduction to Santa Claus in person was as he rode through the Edmonton training hall high atop a rather noisy fully equipped all terrain military vehicle. Years

later when our family moved to Toronto my father remained attached to the Navy through HMCS York at the Lake Ontario waterfront.

Of course, a child's outside view of the armed forces and the perspective of those serving within are very different things even during times of relative peace. In spite of that, even we, at our young age, sensed something of the strong community that is sustained among those who serve within our Armed Forces. Perhaps most of all it is the profound lesson to be learned from those who put others ahead of themselves. This wasn't just a group of people who happened, as if by accident, to be that way but had worked at and dedicated themselves to a training that aimed at making this a better world for us all.

Since the beginning of the pandemic, communities across the country have been strained in ways quite unfamiliar to most of us including members of the armed forces. Numbering less than one third of one percent of the Canadian population (roughly 100,000), our armed forces have collectively responded to the needs of Canadians in incredibly reassuring ways in long term care homes, in fire ravaged communities and, even as I write, in flood-stricken parts of this beautiful country to mention only that work which happens to make the front page news. To say that we are so very grateful is indeed an understatement.

As padre to the 441 it is a great privilege to serve our Wing in the humble ways

I can. As I do so I cannot help but be reflective of all who have served and continue to serve this nation in which we are so blessed to live. In this season of expectation, it is clear that their special work, their sacrifice for all Canadians and others across the world imparts something of that precious gift of hope.

8. <u>RCAF Anniversary Pins:</u>

Following a well-established Borden tradition, commemorative pins were produced again this year to mark the anniversary of the birth of the Royal Canadian Air Force on April 1st, 1924. The tradition of producing buttons or pins featuring a different theme aircraft each year goes back more than three decades in Borden, "Birthplace of the RCAF." Today, the tradition is kept alive through the efforts of RCAF 441 (Huronia) Wing, RCAF Association - Barrie.



As this year marked the 75th anniversary of the Consolidated PBY Catalina flying boat being retired from service with the Royal Canadian Air Force, we are paying tribute to those who flew, maintained, and served on-board this aircraft. Between 1941 and 1945, the Catalina flying boat and its amphibious version, the Canso, were used extensively in maritime patrol and anti-submarine warfare roles. Flight Lieutenant David Hornell (RCAF) was awarded the Victoria Cross for his actions involving a Canso aircraft in the North

Atlantic, and Squadron Leader Leonard Birchall gained fame while flying a Catalina in the Pacific theatre when he spotted and reported the Japanese carrier fleet approaching Ceylon. The Catalina was retired from Canadian service in 1946, but its Canso version continued to serve in a Search & Rescue role until 1962.

12. <u>TIME CAPSULE: "Alan Arnett McLeod, VC": By Randolf Rice</u>

One hundred and three years after his death, it is hard to put into perspective the life and death of Alan Arnett McLeod, VC. He lived only a very short time and his only contribution to the world at nineteen was his life. So why is it so important he be remembered?

Alan Arnett McLeod was born on 20 April 1899 in Stonewall, Manitoba, Canada. When the Great War erupted in August 1914, he promptly enlisted until the powers to be realized his age and sent him home. McLeod waited patiently until attaining the minimum age desired for military service and then applied for pilot training with the Royal Flying Corps (RFC). He was accepted and enlisted on 23 April 1917, fourteen days after **the battle of** Vimy Ridge. He made his first flight on 4 June 1917 at Long Branch, Toronto and after just three hours dual instruction flew his first solo flight on 9 June. After further training at Camp Borden, he was awarded his RFC wings brevet on 31 July 1917.

Alan's first operational unit was with 82 Squadron RFC at Waddington, England where he flew the Armstrong Whitworth FK8 two seat bomber.

In November 1917, McLeod was transferred to 51 Home Defence Squadron. Late November found him at St. Omer as a member of the RFC pilots pool and reporting to 2 Squadron at Hesdigneul, France. There he flew the AWFK 8 known as the "Big Ack", a general-purpose bomber with a top speed of 90 mph in an army co-operation role such as recce and bombing

His enthusiasm and real desire to fly a fighter found him using his bomber as a fighter, strafing trenches and artillery gun sites, so much so his CO called him "a young fire-eater".

On 19 December the young pilot and his gunner observer attacked a formation of eight German Albatross scouts breaking it up and claiming one kill. Later in January 1918 he engaged a German observation balloon, destroyed it while fighting off protective fighters. For this action he and his observer were mentioned in dispatches.

March 1918 was the great German offensive and directly opposite McLeod's 2 Squadron near Amiens was Richthofen's Flying Circus.

On 27 March, seven AWFK 8's of 2 Squadron, including McLeod's with his gunner observer, Lieutenant A.W. Hammond, MC took off for a bombing run on massing German troops. After a fruitless reconnaissance and flying independently, McLeod was about to abandon his sortie when a balloon was spotted below him. He quickly dived to attack, but, before he could get within range, a lone Fokker triplane appeared cruising at about 3000 feet. Immediately, the Canadian pulled his aircraft into a climb to engage the German where Hammond shot it down. The combat had been seen by a loose formation of German Fokkers from the circus who immediately piled down on the bomber to seek their revenge for their lost comrade.

In the ensuing battle, Hammond was wounded three times and McLeod once in the leg. One of the German pilots, Hans Kirchstein maintained a relentless attack on the lone bomber continuously raking it with machine gun fire, damaging the fuselage and setting the fuel tank on fire forcing Hammond to move about the stricken aircraft. The flames burned away the cockpits of the crew and set McLeod's flying boots and coat aflame while his instrument board and control column were engulfed in smoke. Satisfied his victim was doomed, Kirchstein broke off the engagement leaving McLeod to crablike slide slip his aircraft in an attempt to prevent raging flames from reaching Hammond clinging precariously to his Scarff ring gun mounting. All through this ordeal, McLeod had been controlling the aircraft with the control column from the lower left wing root as most of his cockpit was completely gone.

As McLeod's bomber was rapidly descending to a blazing end, one Fokker followed it down and despite his grievous wounds, Hammond managed a burst into the German and sending him into his own lines.

The blazing bomber crashed in No Man's Land and slithered into a crater. Although wounded in five times, McLeod pulled the unconscious Hammond from the wreck despite knowing his fully bombed up plane could blow them to bits any second. With Hammond on his back, McLeod headed towards friendly lines. In the process he was wounded by shrapnel finally making it to a section of the line and collapsing from loss of blood and exhaustion. For five hours they were unable to move to a dressing station due to the German barrage. Hammond had suffered six wounds and a shattered leg. Finally, after an extensive stretcher borne journey, they arrived at Prince of Wales hospital in London where for several weeks young McLeod lingered near death from his many wounds.

Notified of his son's critical condition, McLeod's father travelled from Canada to spend two months by his side as he slowly recovered.

On 1 May 1918, the London Gazette announced the award of the Victoria Cross to McLeod and on the 4 September wearing the newly introduced RAF uniform and accompanied by his father, he hobbled with two canes to receive his cross from the king. Immediately afterward he was sent home to convalesce, arriving in Winnipeg 30 September 1918.

Gradually his health improved, but in November 1918, the Spanish flu struck Alan Arnett McLeod VC and still visibly weak, he passed away on 6 November. He was buried in Kildonan cemetery, Winnipeg just two days before the armistice in Europe. His courageous companion Hammond recovered from his wounds and was awarded a bar to his MC.

At nineteen years of age, Alan McLeod was the youngest recipient of a VC for aerial operations during 1914-18 war and was only the second youngest air VC of both world conflicts.

13. <u>2021 Barrie Legion Poppy Campaign:</u>

The Barrie Legion's Poppy Campaign was a tremendous success. They surpassed last year's amount of \$109,000 by collecting \$140,000 this year. This success would not have been possible without the numerous volunteers who dedicated their time. Some of the people who went above and beyond this year were Mary-Florence and Michael Bartley, Bob Burch who was here almost every day, working the phones, taking orders and delivering poppies, as well as Michel Cormier and Ellen Stahls who on many occasions worked 12-hour days. Local business owners Peter Lorimer and John Tom also provided outstanding assistance and support to the campaign. Another gentleman of note was Mr. Will Dwyer, who at 96 years of age and by himself, collected over \$11,000.00. He and his son Ron kept delivering the money collected on a daily basis.

14. <u>Canada kicks Boeing from jet competition, narrows search to F-35 and</u> <u>Swedish Gripen</u> The Canadian Press - Wed., December 1, 2021, 5:47 p.m.

OTTAWA — Canada has officially narrowed its decade-long hunt for a new fighter jet to two choices as the federal government confirmed U.S. aerospace giant Boeing's Super Hornet is out of the running to replace the military's aging CF-18s.

The announcement from Public Services and Procurement Canada came nearly a week after The Canadian Press reported the surprise news that Boeing had been told its bid for the \$19-billion contract did not meet Ottawa's requirements.

The Liberal government refused to comment publicly at that time, and there was uncertainty around whether the U.S. aerospace giant had been dropped from the competition to provide Canada with 88 new fighter jets.

But the federal procurement department confirmed in a statement Wednesday, 1 Dec 2022, that Lockheed Martin's F-35 stealth fighter and the Swedish Saab Gripen are the only two aircraft still in contention.

While the statement did not say why Boeing's offer did not make the cut, the fact that one of the two U.S. companies competing for the contract failed to make the final shortlist represents a major turn of events.

"Proposals were rigorously assessed on elements of capability, cost and economic benefits," Public Services and Procurement Canada said. "The evaluation also included an assessment of economic impact."

Many observers had seen the Super Hornet and F-35 as the only real competition because of Canada's close relationship with the United States, which includes using fighter jets together to defend North American air space on a daily basis.

Sweden is not a member of NATO or NORAD, the joint Canadian-American defence command responsible for protecting the continent from foreign threats. That had prompted questions about the Gripen's compatibility with U.S. aircraft.

Both Lockheed Martin and Saab said Wednesday that they looked forward to working with the government during the final stretch of the competition.

Exactly what happens next wasn't immediately clear on Wednesday, with the procurement department saying it will "finalize next steps" in the coming

weeks. However, the department did indicate those steps could involve final negotiations with the top bidder or "entering into a competitive dialogue, whereby the two remaining bidders would be provided with an opportunity to improve their proposals."

The government is still hoping to award a final contract next year, it added, with the first new aircraft delivered in 2025.
