

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BOARD OF DIRECTORS REPORT

1. MEDIA OUTREACH

To help promote the Wing, two media events were arranged. Post Media, the publisher of the London Free Press and the Londoner provided four free ads in the Londoner in July and August.

In July, Nadine Abi Raad, parliamentary assistant to MP Lindsay Mathyssen and fellow Wing member, Linda Brimson met to draft a press release. Once approved by the Board, Nadine sent the final version to the media. Allison Devereau of CBC Radio in London responded and she interviewed Chuck Hardy the Board designated Wing representative on July 30th. It focused on the need of our membership to be representative of the diverse wider population of the London area. Also covered was the Wing support of six Air Cadet Squadrons. Other topics included the history of the RCAF and the celebration of the glorious tradition of service to Canada and the wider community, Secrets of Radar Museum and the need to raise funds to offset losses due to COVID-19.

2. TREASURER

Former Board Member and Acting Treasurer, Barry Sandler is training the new Treasurer, Janet Pole, on the use of the accounting software package "QuickBooks". This system allows a wider use of recording and reporting. There are some advantages over spreadsheets such as using invoices for membership renewals. More accuracy in inventory control is another feature.



The Caterpillar Club -

I know of one storied Spitfire pilot, Jerry Billing of Windsor-Essex area (deceased in 2015 at age 93) who successfully bailed out twice, during WWII. You can read about him on various internet sites. I wondered if there are Wing members or veterans in our area who have the distinction of having parachuted to safety? Please let us know, for the next edition of the Link.

It is described as the club that no one wants to join. And those who become members do so, quite literally, by accident. The Caterpillar Club is an informal association of people who have successfully used a parachute to bail out of a disabled aircraft. After authentication by the parachute maker, applicants receive a membership certificate and a distinctive lapel pin. The nationality of the person saving their life by parachute and ownership of the aircraft are not factors in determining qualification for membership; anybody who has saved their life by using a parachute after bailing out of a disabled aircraft is eligible. The requirement that the aircraft is disabled naturally excludes parachuting enthusiasts in the normal course of a recreational jump, or those involved in military training jumps.

The club was founded by Leslie Irvin of the Irvin Airchute Company of Canada in 1922. (Though Leslie Irvin is credited with inventing the first free-fall parachute in 1919, parachutes stored in canisters had saved the lives of observers in balloons and several German, Austro-Hungarian pilots of disabled military aircraft in the First World War.) The name "Caterpillar Club" simply makes reference to the silk threads that made the original parachutes, thus recognizing the debt owed to the silk worm. Other people have taken the metaphor further by comparing the act of baling out with that of the caterpillar letting itself down to earth by a silken thread. Another metaphor is that caterpillars have to climb out of their cocoons to escape. "Life depends on a silken thread" is the club's motto.

An early brochure of the Irvin Parachute Company credits William O'Connor, 24 August 1920 at McCook Field near Dayton, Ohio as the first person to be saved by an Irvin parachute, but this feat was unrecognized. On 20 October 1922, Lieutenant Harold R. Harris, chief of the McCook Field Flying Station, jumped from a disabled Loening W-2A monoplane fighter. Shortly after, two reporters from the Dayton Herald, realizing that there would be more jumps in future, suggested that a club should be formed. Harris became the first member and from that time forward any person who jumped from a disabled aircraft with a parachute became a member of the Caterpillar Club. Other famous members include General James Doolittle, Charles Lindbergh and (retired) astronaut John Glenn.

In 1922 Leslie Irvin agreed to give a gold pin to every person whose life was saved by one of his parachutes. At the end of World War II the number of members with the Irvin pins had grown to over 34,000 though the total of people saved by Irvin parachutes is estimated to be 100,000.

The successor to the original Irvin company still provides pins to people who have made a jump. In addition to the Irvin Air Chute Company, other parachute manufacturers have also issued caterpillar pins for successful jumps. GC Parachutes formed their

Gold Club in 1940. The Switlik Parachute Company of Trenton, New Jersey issued both gold and silver caterpillar pins. The Pioneer Parachute Co. in Skokie, Illinois, also presented plaques to people who packed the parachutes that saved lives.

Membership requirements

There are no annual fees, though the Switlik club charges a nominal enrollment fee. Both the Irvin and Switlik clubs issue gold and silver pins depicting caterpillars. The Irvin Golden Caterpillar has amethyst eyes. Prospective members must send documentation of the incident to the manufacturer, which then conducts its own research.

The requirements for membership are rigid – members must have saved their lives by jumping with a parachute. Consequently, RAF Sgt. Nicholas Alkemade, who during World War II bailed out of a RAF Avro Lancaster without a parachute and landed uninjured in a snow-drift, was refused membership because a parachute had not been used. More recently, a group of twelve skydivers were denied membership when one of them fouled the plane's tail and caused it to fall from the sky. He died in the crash but the other eleven parachuted to safety. They did not qualify because it had been their original intention to jump from the plane. The pilot, however, was admitted to the club.

Today the ranks of Caterpillar Club members number in the tens of thousands; men and women, and even a Scottish 12-year old glider passenger. Both Irvin Air Chute Company (today as Airborne Systems) and Switlik Parachute Company continue to register members. Famous members include John Glenn, Jimmy Doolittle, and George H. W. Bush. With four jumps to his credit, Charles Lindbergh is probably the member with the most pins.

Active branches

There are branches in Canada, the USA and Britain. An active branch of the Caterpillar Club has its annual reunion/dinner/ dance in Blackpool in the Northwest of England each March. The club has approximately 70 members, either ex-WW2 RAF aircrew, family members of deceased members or associate members. Despite its 'North West' title the Club welcomes ex-Caterpillars from across the UK and worldwide. The Club secretary can be contacted via the Doric Hotel, Blackpool.



Military College Life



I joined the Canadian Armed Forces in 1983. I went to the French military college in Saint Jean sur Richelieu, QC, about an hour's drive from Montreal. At that time, the college was called Le Collège militaire royal de Saint-Jean or CMR for short. (And, yes, not all the words are capitalized as is the custom in the French language.) The program was a five year one – prep, first, second, third and fourth year.

- In 1952, CMR was set up as a feeder school for Royal Military College (RMC) in Kingston, ON. Its purpose was twofold. First, the government wanted to increase the number of Francophones in the officer corps. Second, the government wanted to provide the opportunity to achieve higher ranks for two under-represented groups – French Canadians and Atlantic Canadians.
- In 1971, CMR established a formal partnership with the Université de Sherbrooke where CMR cadets were able to obtain a Bachelor's degree without leaving Saint Jean.
- Female cadets were not allowed entry until September 1980, so I was in the fourth class of women.
- In 1985, the Quebec government passed an act granting CMR its own university charter. This worked out great for me since I was able to graduate from the actual university that I attended.
- In 1995, massive government cutbacks on defence spending forced the Department of National Defence to close CMR.
- In 2007, the reopening of CMR was announced for the fall term.

While I was at CMR, from July 1983 until May 1988, the rules were fairly strict. Boyfriend – girlfriend relationships were a No-No, although the unwritten rule was always "don't flaunt it and don't get caught." Everybody lived in the dormitories. There were no exceptions. Today, cadets may date openly. At RMC, cadets who want to rent civilian accommodation can ask permission to live off-campus.

I think I prefer the way that it was back in the '80s. We were stuck together and we learned to flourish as a group. We knew how to help each other because we knew everyone's strengths and weaknesses. We were a truly bilingual university which was a great asset as an officer. Sure, we played language jokes on each other. There are two that I can still remember today. We taught the Francophones that if they wanted to ask someone for help, all they had to say was, "what's the scam, momma jam?" In turn, they taught us that to ask someone to be a little guieter, all we needed to say was "ta queule." In actuality, that meant "shut up." By the end of my five years there, I was bilingual. I knew my academics in both French and English. I knew my drill in both languages. I even knew my Christmas carols and my church prayers in French. That certainly gave me confidence moving forward as an officer in the military. Life at CMR was probably one of the most difficult things I've ever done. In the end, it was well worth my effort.



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Restarting Lunches at the Wing

As we move closer to the date at which we will begin offering lunch again at the Wing, we are preparing procedures and methods to ensure your enjoyment, your safety and the safety of the volunteer staff. We thought you'd like to know, in advance, what to expect. At the time of publishing, no date has been set for the restart of offering lunches.

Due to the limits on attendance inside the Wing building during various phases of reopening in Ontario, we are moving toward using a reservation system. Reservations will be accepted up to the middle of the week so we may know the numbers who will attend. Patrons will be told of the week's menu when they call to make a reservation.

Before you arrive:

If you are not feeling well that morning, we ask you not come to the Wing. You may call and let us know anytime.

When you arrive:

The south door will act as an entrance and the east door will act as an exit. Those with mobility issues can use either door for entry and exit. You will be asked if you are feeling OK. You will not be tested for temperature or anything else. The wearing of masks inside is mandatory. If you forget to bring one, we will provide you with one for a small donation. Please wear the mask at all times unless you are eating or drinking.

Physical distancing placeholders will be on the floor marking where to stand when paying for lunch or ordering from the bar.

The meal service:

Like a restaurant, you will be assigned a table, with a limit of 4 persons per table. Your lunch will be brought to you. Everything is disposable. If you need service, raise your hand and your server will attend to you. Procedures for the snowball and 50/50 draws are still being worked out.

The two washrooms in the common area will be open.

We realize that this will present quite a change from the usual. Hopefully we can all enjoy the experience and be safe at the same time
