




and find out what that truly stands for and if the shoe fits be a supporter or a member.



HONOURING OUR PAST, CELEBRATING OUR FUTURE



This year the Veterans' Classic recognized Sir. Michael Sydorko. He was presented with a Quilt of Honour. Mike was from Lac du Bonnet, Manitoba and joined the Canadian army at age 15. He eventually found himself in England, training for the assault on Fortress Europe as a member of the Lake Superior Regiment within the 4th Canadian Armoured Division. Mike specialized in flame throwers. He saw action in France, Belgium, Holland and Germany and eventually became Acting Sergeant.

One day, Mike came upon a German officer who was in obvious pain, a touniquiet applied to his right leg which was missing below the knee. He offered the enemy officer a shot of morphine from his own personal medical pack. "I'll never forget the look I got from him, the thanks from his eyes about two minutes later when the pain disappeared".

Mike, a 427 Wing member, has kept in touch with members of his Regiment that he describes as "good people, tough men, not the sort of guys whose toes you'd want to step on."

Mike was awarded the French Legion of Honour in 2014 for the role he played in the Liberation of German-occupied Franche in 1944.

Wing member Randy Warden was also an Honoured Veteran and received a Quilt of Honour at the event.

At a ceremony recently attended by senior representatives of 31 Canadian Brigade Group, HMCS Prevost, the RCMP and Royal Canadian Legion, Mayor Ed Holder was presented with London's first poppy.

From the last Friday in October to Remembrance Day, millions of Canadians wear a Poppy as a visual pledge to never forget those who sacrificed for our freedom.

The person who first introduced the Poppy to Canada and the



Commonwealth was Lieutenant-Colonel John McCrae of Guelph, Ontario, a Canadian Medical Officer during the First World War. John McCrae penned the Poem "In Flanders Fields" on a scrap of paper in May, 1915 on the day following the death of a fellow soldier. While the Poppy is distributed freely to all who wish to wear one, the Legion gratefully accepts donations to the Poppy Fund.

## Battle of Britain Luncheon spokesman brings hope to Arrow enthusiasts

Although this year's Battle of Britain Luncheon held on September 20th, was well attended and well received, it was unusual. For the first time in recent history, our guest speaker did not make any reference to the epic air battle that took place during the summer of 1940. Nevertheless, to judge from the questions fired at him after his speech, Jack Hurst was likely the only person his audience would ever get this close to, who could answer that burning question: Why did they cancel the Arrow program?

The Luncheon got underway with the seating of the Head Table, the diners and our Padre, Frank Mantz. Rev. Mantz brought everyone's attention to the purpose for our gathering through his very inspirational prayer, which included the names of Wing members who had passed away since our last Battle of Britain Luncheon. This was followed by the recitation by four Wing members of the names of the 22 Canadian flyers who were killed in the Battle of Britain, then a Moment of Silence, the Act of Remembrance and Prayers.

We then enjoyed a delicious roast beef dinner, dessert, tea and coffee and a short intermission before re-assembly and Toasts to the Queen, Canada, and Fallen Comrades. The MC then introduced our speaker for the Luncheon, Mr. Jack Hurst, whose topic for the afternoon was the Avro Canada CF-105, more generally known as the Avro Arrow.

Jack Hurst spoke initially of his career as a photographer, which began at the age of 17 when he was hired by Avro Canada in Toronto (Malton). He eventually became an air-to-air photographer, chasing high-speed aircraft around the skies. He has logged more than 400 hours in the back seat of a CF-100, has his own flying suit – now arrayed with crests and logos – and his own helmet and locker. In addition, he was paid "danger pay" of \$5 an hour for every hour he flew to take photographs, which he describes as, "a lot of fun up there," including his photos of RL 205, the last Arrow to fly.

Jack brought history to life in his address to the Wing members. The first Avro Arrow (CF-105) rolled off the production line on October 4, 1957, the same date the Russians launched Sputnik, the first manmade object into orbit. Both these events took place at a time when the "Cold War" between the Soviets and the West was at its height. Six months later, on March 25, 1958, the first flight of the Avro Arrow prototype took place. It was deemed capable of flying at nearly three times the speed of sound to an altitude of 60,000 feet. Many observers were certain that development of the Arrow would help to deter any Russian aggression. Some saw the Arrow as a great national symbol and the pride of all Canadians.

But then, as Jack Hurst told us, it was a year later on Friday, February 20, 1959, the day that became known as "Black Friday," that the Arrow program was abruptly cancelled. One aviation historian thought the reason for the cancellation was, "a mixture of politics, timing and bad luck." The Canadian government said it was because the project "had become too costly and no longer worth the money." As Jack Hurst described it, "They told us to go home and not come back." About fifteen thousand people lost their jobs that afternoon and many thousands more jobs in the supply chain, parts manufacturers and other support networks were gone within six months. Canadians were left to wonder "why?"







About three years ago, Jack moved his family to London, Ontario and is now semi-retired. Despite his 80 plus years, he maintains a great interest in photography and in particular, his involvement in the "Raise the Arrow" project. The project is an effort to recover the nine, one-eighth scale free-flight Arrow models launched on a Nike rocket booster over Lake Ontario, from Point Petre in Prince Edward County, as part of the Arrow program. Despite efforts made to date, all but one of the nine still rest on the bottom of Lake Ontario, covered in zebra mussels.

Another remarkable thing about Jacks speech was that it was only one-half of his well-thought out and delivered presentation. He usually provides a visual slide show as well, which is handled by his friend, John Bertram, who was unable to accompany Jack to the Wing. However, before he left, Jack promised to return with his slide show, and he will be most welcome again.

**Dovers's Guardians.** This is a photo of a gift sent to the Wing recently by veterans at Parkwood Hospital. It is a plywood box with the letters "Dover's Guardians" in block letters on each side. Behind the glass front is a scenic representation of the white cliffs of Dover, England. In the sea below the cliffs are two Canadian warships, while flying overhead are Mosquito and Hurricane aircraft. On the right is the former Canadian flag which was flown during WW II, fluttering in the breeze from an unseen fan on the upper right. ## On Parade



"I Remember" - Veterans' Memoirs - is a 129 page book which contains the autobiographies of 27 veterans who are, or were, residents of the Veterans Care program at the Parkwood Institute here in London. Published in 2017 it is the fourth of similar books written and well received between 1998 and 2005..Several of the names of the contributors should be well-known to Wing members, such as Mel Hymers and Lorne Spicer, and there are no less than six female authors included. As the preface to the book states, there are: "revealing and powerful themes of life, love and loss, these engaging stories are told in the veterans' own words." This year's edition of veterans' stories was collected by Ann Pigott, a familiar face at the Arts and Crafts section. She mentions in her Preface that "the veterans spoke with sincerity, openness and humour about their lifetime experiences . . . ranging from the ordinary to the extraordinary, with a poignancy that is both powerful and moving."

In addition there are black and white photographs of all the veterans, some taken in their very younger years when they enlisted, and others taken much later in life. In all, an excellent opportunity to pick up a Christmas gift that would appeal to all ages, and at a very reasonable price of only \$20. Books are on sale at our Kitshop or speak to Flo, Fred Pettit, or any member of the Board of Directors.
