#### LIFE, CADETS, AND MY STORY (SO FAR)

**Cynthia Russell** 



I will celebrate my 65<sup>th</sup> birthday in November. This milestone is of particular significance to me as it will mark my "Compulsory Retirement Age" from the Canadian Armed Forces. I've had a little bit of time to get my head around this. Last summer, I received an official letter from the Commanding Officer of the Regional Cadet Support Unit extending personal regards on behalf of the Chief of Defence Staff, reminding me of my impending big birthday, and advising that my loyal and dedicated years of service have been greatly appreciated. Even with all that advance warning, it will be a bittersweet moment. The CAF, RCAF, and Cadet Instructor Cadre have been a huge part of my life these last several years and the moment I report to Supply at CFB Trenton with all my kit packed up for return, will be quite monumental. This is, therefore, a perfect time to reflect on the course of events and life experiences that brought me to this point in time.

Although I lived in a few southern Ontario locales during my childhood, I spent my high school years here, in Belleville, Ontario. After graduating from Centennial Secondary School, I moved to Toronto and worked in the banking industry on Bay Street. I had always aspired to become a police officer and an opportunity arose for me with the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. I became a member in the late 1970s. I worked at RCMP "O" Division Headquarters in Toronto and some years, moves, and children later, found myself in Sudbury, Ontario. I found this to be an ideal time for a change in direction and enrolled at Laurentian University where I studied Nursing and Psychology. Following graduation, I returned, once again, to Toronto and focused on family life with my husband, Mark, and our three children.

Fast forward to 2009 when my son, Spencer, became an Air Cadet. I was not very familiar with the cadet program. Females were not permitted to be cadets when I was a teenager, so it wasn't ever on my radar. It was, however, a perfect fit for Spencer. He joined 618 Queen City Royal Canadian Air Cadet Squadron in Toronto and I became a Civilian Volunteer with the unit. In 2010, our family decided to shift our home base to our property in Prince Edward County and Spencer transferred to 608 Duke of Edinburgh RCACS. As a cadet parent, I was very impressed by the program. The opportunities for development of leadership, confidence, and commitment were unique and I could see the impact. I was so impressed, in fact, I applied to the CAF to become a RCAF reservist with the Cadet Instructor Cadre.

CIC Officers are recruited from two streams – former cadets who wish to stay involved and give back to the program, and cadet parents who wish to contribute and make an impact. The latter recruits are referred to as "SIPS" – sucked in parents. I was, of course, a SIP. I was attested in November 2013.

I attended my Basic Officer Training Course, as an Officer Cadet, at CFB Borden in the spring of 2014. I was terrified, challenged, and very, very relieved to return home upon successful completion. My ambition was the only thing that compelled me to overcome my fear and return, once again, to Borden for my next course. This experience was a little better and I was becoming familiar with the expectations and rigours of course life when I completed my Occupational Training Course. I received my commission and promotion to Second Lieutenant on 28 September 2014. Over the course of my CIC career, I have also completed the Intermediate Officer Training Course, Commanding Officer Course, and Administration Officer Course. The result of this course work has been confidence in my knowledge and the ability to excel in my job. I have always felt well equipped and supported in my roles both as a Squadron Officer and as a Commanding officer. In addition, the life experience I brought to the table further strengthened all that I had to offer the program.

committed My entire CIC tenure has been at 608 Duke of Edinburgh Royal Canadian Air Cadet Squadron. I was initially the Assistant Supply Officer and Assistant Administration Officer. I was the Administration Officer and subsequently the Training Officer before becoming the Commanding Officer in September 2017. It was at the Change of Command Ceremony that I was promoted to my current rank of Captain. The CO role is a three-year commitment, and I found the responsibility to be all-consuming and absolutely fulfilling. I was so impressed by the dedication of the staff and the development and accomplishments of the cadets in our charge. We were able to provide so many enriching experiences for the cadets. There were March Break trips to Toronto and Ottawa and familiarization flights in gliders and even in a CC130J-Hercules! There were overnight field training exercises, Mess Dinners, competitions, and ceremonies. The thing I will remember most are those times that the cadets

exhibited the highest levels of community benevolence and citizenship. They showed their community an example of the very best their generation has to offer. They stepped up and made a difference. They offered food and support to feed those in need through Not Alone Quinte and helped out with collection for the Gleaners Food Drive. Their show of support for our veterans through participation in the Poppy Campaign, and ceremonies of remembrance illustrate their commitment to service in their community. I was immeasurably proud of, and inspired by, these young people. They are, dedicated, and possess such focus in their pursuit of excellence. It was an honour to be their Commanding Officer.

My CIC career was enhanced by the opportunity to serve further through longer Class B contracts during Cadet Summer Training Courses. In this capacity, I was Assistant Canteen Officer at Trenton Cadet Training Center in 2014, Shift Supervisor with Mountain View Cadet Flying Training Center in 2015, Deputy Chief Training Support with MVCFTC in 2016 and 2017, Administration Officer at MVCFTC in 2019, and Facilitator - Instructional Techniques at Virtual Cadet Training Center Alpha in 2019. All of these additional employment opportunities served to increase my knowledge base and my own personal development, but more importantly, to ensure that cadets had full access to enriching summer learning opportunities.

So, here we are. As I now complete my last few obligations as a CIC Officer, I feel grateful for this final career. I feel grateful for the opportunities I have had to serve and grateful because I truly feel I have made a difference in the lives of these young people through this wonderful program. Much of the time we devote to the cadet program is voluntary (many, many, many volunteer hours). We are reservists with a very low cap on what we are paid. With this in mind, some people might ask why we do it. The answer presented itself to me a few years ago.

During March Break of 2019, I organized a 2 day bus trip to Ottawa for our squadron. The trip was very heavy on Citizenship activities – a tour of the Diefenbunker, War Museum, Canadian Senate, and Rideau Hall – and it was light on what might be called 'fun' activities. Nevertheless, the cadets were keen and fully engaged. The unit was travelling along Rideau Street – walking in 2s, in an extremely orderly manner, toward The National War Memorial. As they approached, in formation, up the long low steps toward The Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, I witnessed something that will stay with me forever. This was without a word being said, nor an instruction given. As each pair of cadets reached the top step, they saluted in unison and flanked to the left and the right, The Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. 40 cadets, 20 pairs, saluting and flanking as if in a choreographed ballet – in utter silence – at this somber Cenotaph, this site of tragedy and remembrance. They were so respectful and aware. They knew without being told. These are our future leaders. These are cadets. This image is what I will recall when I think of my CIC career.

I'm not certain what lies ahead, but I know Mark and I will be blissfully keeping up with our three grown children and five grandchildren as we await the next adventure, just around the corner.


