President's Message

ear members, at this time of the year we are obliged and honoured to remember our comrades who 'did not make it back.' Let us also remember our brothers and sisters of this Wing who are no longer with us, in particular Charlie Casson and Alex **Cook** who passed away most recently.

As you know, I recently attended the National General Meeting in Calgary, which is now held every two years. The host unit, 783 Calgary Wing, went all out

to provide for an interesting and worthwhile experience. Saturday was spent at the Hotel on association business. I'll come back to this. On Sunday we were bussed about 80 kilometers from Calgary to the Nanton Air Museum for the Remembrance Day Ceremony, joined by members of 783 Wing. The main feature

here is a Lanc converted this year to a 'Dam Buster'. is towed outside and fired up. The craft does not fly but could be made air worthy with mucho bucks in general repairs. People come from all over to see this. Quite the amazing experience to stand about 50 feet from the four roaring engines.

In the afternoon we were bussed back in the old cheese wagon to the Calgary Military Museum where we received a guided tour and some great stories of the F-86, CF104, and the CF18, by people, now retired, who actually flew the type. Supper was provided "under the wing of the 18." An interesting aside to this craft.

So, what happened at the meeting? Nothing. Nada. Nothing of any consequence. There is no plan nor bolt of enlightenment-not even a hint of one. Perhaps I'm being a trifle abrasive but I did bring this up at the last Regional AGM and off-line at this one and pretty well at every regional meeting we have. I was told on both occasions that it is being looked at and discussed, above my pay grade. It is akin to a politician Last thoughts. Solution: encourage members to remember the *Fund* in their wills–certainly a generous gesture, reasonable request but not an immediate solution. (Think about this for a second.) I won't belabour the point with respect to how it is shrinking and thus not meeting its targets. Oh, yes. And whoever does not support the Trust Fund should not be wearing the "Blazer". I may have a skewed perception, but it seems that the Fund is or is becoming our raison d'être.

Moving on, a couple of more concerns worth mentioning were brought forth from the National Headquarters, which is how the NEC prefers to be called now. The question of why there were no resolutions submitted for this General Meeting was asked. I can think of a couple of reasons. The old axiom, "Be careful of what you ask for as you may get it" comes to mind. Also of concern was the sparse attendance by Wings at this BNAGM. Fleet Fort

The Fleet Fort was the only aircraft designed and built by Canadians during World War II. It was also the first all-metal monoplane built by Fleet Aircraft which was located in Fort Erie. Although it was

designed as an intermediate trainer for pilot training after the Tiger Moth and before the Harvard, the Fort

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
was declared redundant in this role and became a platform to train wireless operators.

A limited number of 101 was produced for the RCAF between 1941 and 1942. The Fort had some unique, if not odd, features: fixed undercarriage but retractable fairings, as well as a raised rear cockpit. A student would become familiar with retracting gear, just not the undercarriage. Thus...fewer pilot errors on landings.

Essentially as the Fort was quite easy to fly, it was deemed unsuitable as a step towards flying a Harvard. The lowly Fort was bumped out by the de Havilland Tiger Moth and the Fleet Finch.

Wing Member Gord Hunter








F/L Charles Harold Casson CD
